THE LATE COUNTESS OF DUNRAVEN.

Mr. Fitzgibbon, in seconding the resolution, said that Lord Dunraven was a member of the Council for a number of years, and was respected by all his colleagues. The bereavement he suffered was shared by the county in general.

During his illness he was visited on four occasions by Canon Waller, who has been for some time in France, and just returned home. The deceased was a member of the congregation of Trinity Church, as is his father, Mr. R. G. Hetherington, Supt. G.P.O. Limerick, and the other members of his family. The sympathy of very many friends will be extended to them in their grief. Deceased was a bright and unassuming young fellow, beloved by all who knew him.
