DEATH OF LIMERICK SOLDIER.

The death has taken place in St John's Hospital of Private Christopher Brummel, of the Munster Fusiliers. The deceased was formerly an officer in the City Regiment of National Volunteers, and was highly respected by his colleagues. After the outbreak of war he joined the Munsters, and with his regiment went through many notable engagements in the western theatre.

The funeral of the deceased soldier took place on Thursday from St Michael's Parochial Church for Mount St Lawrence Cemetery, full military honours being paid. The 4th Leinster Regiment furnished their band, a firing party, and a detachment of the corps which, with some of the Limerick National Volunteers, followed the remains. The coffin covered with the Union Jack, and with a number of wreaths thereon, was borne on an Engineer carriage, and the band of the Leinsters, playing Handel's "Dead March," preceded the procession. The interment having taken place, three volleys were fired over the grave, and the "Last Post" was sounded.

HAY BURNING IN CLARE.

Four Arrests on Suspicion.

A special court was held last week at the police barrack, Ennis, by Mr George McElroy, R.M. when four young men named Denis Connellan, Thomas Griffin, Denis Griffin, and Thos Casey were charged that they did, at Driminure, on the night of the 12th or the morning of the 13th September, unlawfully and maliciously set fire to and destroy a stack of hay, the property of Mr Wm O'Connor.

Mr Davis, D.I., Corofin, who prosecuted made a formal deposition. To complete his inquiries, he asked for a remand of the accused for eight days.

The accused, who were not legally represented, were remanded in custody.

HAY CROP IN IRELAND, 1916.

The excessive moisture of May and June according to a leaflet of the Department of Agriculture, encouraged the strong growth of grass in all situations. At the time of cutting which started somewhat later than usual, first and second crop fields were carrying heavy bulks of herbage. A very small proportion of these fields was cut during the broken weather of the earlier part of July, but, when cutting began in general, saving and making up were done under exceedingly favourable conditions. Fields in rotation hay as well as old meadows were in perfect order, and the yields in each category turned out very satisfactory. The feeding quality of the crop has not been so good for many seasons.

The yield for all Ireland in 1916 and 1915 respectively, was as follows:—First year's hay, 1,077,580, against 1,010,854 tons last year; second and third year's hay, 751,075, against 684,606 tons last year; permanent meadow, 3,496,777, against 3,401,312 tons last year.

TAFT AND ROOSEVELT SHAKE HANDS.
