

**LIBERAL NEW GOVERNMENT
Complete Success.**

Mr Asquith and Lord Grey made important speeches at a meeting of the Liberal Party held yesterday at the Reform Club. After stating that a carefully engineered conspiracy had been plotted against Lord Grey and himself, and creating the Liberal Party in the matter, Mr Asquith detailed the recent negotiations with Mr Lloyd George's proposals, while referring to a smaller War Committee, Mr Asquith could not go in as an irresponsible factor of the war. The Prime Minister must be the chairman of the War Committee, and must lead the men to sit on it. Without reserve, he led the new Government complete success, and helped them with all his heart and strength in their great work. Mr Asquith will lead the Liberal Party in the House, and intends to sit on the front Opposition benches, and conduct an Opposition helpful in the execution of the war.

ALLOTMENTS ACT.

On the motion of Mr Dolan, seconded by Mr McKenna, a resolution was adopted urging upon the Government the immediate application of the Allotments and Small Holdings Act to Ireland, and instructing the Committee, in its interview with the Department, to ask the Vice-President's advocacy of that recommendation in Parliament.

COMPULSORY MILITARY SERVICE.

Mr O'Rourke moved a resolution protesting against the putting in force of conscription in Ireland, and expressing the opinion that the Irish nation could not recognise any such act unless it was passed by a Home Rule Parliament for the whole of Ireland sitting in Dublin, not nominated, but duly elected by the Irish people.

Mr Clarke seconded the resolution, which was passed.
