DEATH OF MR E. COFFEY. SOLICITOR.

We regret very much, indeed, to have to announce the death of Mr Edward Coffey, solicitor, which occurred on Sunday night at St. John's Hospital, to the great grief of his relatives and a large circle of city and county friends. The lamented deceased, who was quite a young man in the prime of life, being but in his thirty-fourth year, took ill only a few days since; and to the last it was confidently hoped that his youth would carry him through the complaint, which unexpectedly took a fatal turn. Mr Coffey's family reside in the Birdhill district, but at an early age he came to Limerick, serving his apprenticeship in the offices of the late Mr W. E. Jounihan, solicitor, and Mr P. O'Donnell, solicitor, until he was admitted to the profession. He had a steadily increasing practice, and acted as legal adviser to the Limerick Fishery Conservators, his services being very much appreciated by a large connexion, particularly in county districts. He was unmarried, and his premature death, coming as it did quite unexpectedly, has, in all the cir-cumstances, added to the sympathy which is extended to the relatives of the deceased in the great loss they have sustained by so sad an oceurrence.

The remains of the deceased were removed to St John's Cathedral yesterday, and this morning a solemn Requiem Mass was sung in the Cathedral by the Administrator of St John's, Rev R Fitzgerald, C.C.
