**FUNERAL OF MISS ELLIS,  
ABBEYFEALE.**

The funeral of Miss Dymphna Dobbs Ellis, of Glensrone, Abbeyfeale, took place on Wednesday. Miss Ellis, who was in her 83rd year, was the elder daughter of the late Mr Richard Ellis, J.P., landlord of the town and immediate neighbourhood, and sister of the late Capt Robert Ellis and Rev Thomas Ellis. The funeral was of large proportions, and many marks of respect were shown to the memory of the deceased lady by the people of the town and district. The coffin was borne from Glensrone to the family burial place beside the church at Mountmahon, on the shoulders of a number of the former tenants on the estate. Many expressions of condolence were conveyed to Mrs Owen and Mrs Bentley in their bereavement.

The burial service was conducted by Chancellor J Vance, M.A, Ardagh; Rev W E Bentley, M.A, Feale Bridge; Rev J Craig, Kilflynn.

The chief mourners were—Mrs Bentley (sister); Mrs Owen (niece); Rev W E Bentley, M.A (brother-in-law); Mr John Owen, Ballyhorgan, Listowel (nephew-in-law).
