BRITISH GAINS IN WEST.

Prisoners Taken.

"A series of well executed enterprises" is the description in the official communique of actions undertaken by our troops at various points of the line during yesterday and the previous night.

East of Beaumont Hamel a sector of enemy trenches was seized and consolidated, and 140 prisoners taken. East of Loos a raid resulted in the capture of some prisoners. Opposite Armentieres trenches were entered and many of the enemy killed, and other damage done.

SEPARATION PAYMENTS.

New Scale of Allowances.

We record with very sincere regret the death of a highly esteemed citizen, wir Richard J Lee, which occurred at his residence Rockmount North Strand, on Tuesday evening, in the 67th year of his age. The deceased who was brother of the late Mr Samuel E Lee, J.P. was the senior surviving partner in the firm of Messrs Harrison aud Lee and Sons, Iron-Founders, High street. VICTORY WAR LOAN.

Great City Meeting.

Mr Bonar Law Explains Basis of Loan.

At the great City meeting in support of the new War Loan, held at the Guildhall, London,

Mr Bonar Law said the basis of the loan was the issue of Government Stock at the rate of five per cent., the price of which was ninety-five. That meant almost exactly a yield of 5½ per cent to the investor. The Loan was for a period of thirty years, but the State had the option at the end of twelve years of redeeming it at par if the desire were so felt.

Mr Bonar Law said five per cent would be paid on application, and the balance in fairly equal proportions, the last of which would be May 30th. In addition the Government were giving the option of taking tax compounded loan at the rate of four per cent, issued at par, and redeemable at option at the end of twelve years, and then at the period of twenty-five years. To make it easier for the public to subscribe the Government had extended somewhat the period of subscription. There would be the right of conversion of existing securities, the 41, 5, and 6 per cent Exchequer Bonds into the new Loan at par. He said the German military machine was crumbling, and we had it in our power to secure peace for all time.
