TOBACCO INDUSTRY

Systematic Reduction

It has been decided to begin systematic reduction of work in the tobacco industry (says the "Times"). The manufacturers will be effected in the first instance, and it is stated that one object is to reduce the production of tobacco, but the main object is to withdraw labour for other purposes. It is stated that the importation of tobacco has trebled during the war, and it is estimated at £6,000,000 the year. It is set free all the labour that is now employed in the industry, and the public are urged not to be forced to pay up prices.
