Irish Industrial Exhibition.

The origin of the proposed Exhibition in Dublin is due to the munificence of Mr Dargan—a name familiar in Ireland to require any eulogy. Mr Dargan fully appreciating the value of an effectual stimulus of the national industry of his country, the stimulant it would afford to present to the people, and the foundation it would lay for the development of manufacturing prosperity, such as is fitted to enjoy and destined to acquire, and that princely liberality which has ever distinguished him, placed at the disposal of a committee the munificent sum of twenty thousand pounds to be appropriated by them to the erection of a suitable building, and the defrayment of the other expenses incident to the undertaking. At the inception of the project Mr Dargan undertook the responsibility of acting as secretary, a duty for which his energy and practical experience, and his extensive acquaintance with industrial enterprise in England and the Continent pre-eminently fitted him.
