DEATH OF MR P MCCARTHY CRECORA.

We regret to announce the death of Mr Peter McCarthy, which took place at his residence, Skehana, Crecora, this morning, at an advanced age. The deceased gentleman had been ailing a few weeks, and the end came peacefully. He was a well-known and highly-respected county farmer, and was for many years a member of the Croom Board of Guardians prior to the Local Government Act coming into operation. He was of a kindly, genial, and affable disposition, and his demise is greatly regretted by his family and a wide circle of friends. The funeral will take place on Monday at one o'clock from Crecora R.C Church, after Office and Requiem Mass, for the family burial place, Crecora.
