DEATH OF MR D. L. ROCHE, J.P.

We announce with very sincere regret the death of Mr D L Roche, J.P, which occurred this morning at his residence, Brookville, Ballinacurra, after a brief illness. A little more than a fortnight ago Mr Roche, who up to that time seemed in his usual good health and vigour, had an attack, from which he practically never rallied, despite all that the best medical skill and nursing could do. He was only in his 48th year, and the news of his premature demise will be heard of with deep sorrow throughout Munster, where he was so widely and popularly known. He was manager of the Irish Co-Operative Agency Roxboro' road, since the year 1896, since which time he has permanently resided in Limerick, and from time to time actively identified himself with industrial and other pursuits. He was a prominent member of the old South of Ireland Butter Merchants' Association, a vice-president of the Limerick Industrial Association, and a magistrate for the City of Limerick. He took an active part in working up an Industrial Exhibition held in Limerick many years ago, and was likewise conspicuous in connection with the Munster-Connaught Exhibition of 1906, of which he was one of the directors. He was an old member of the congregation of St Michael's Church and a former member of the Select Vestry. In private as well as business life his invariable courtesy, bright and characteristically genial manner won for him the esteem and regard of a wide circle of friends, who will deeply mourn his premature demise in the fulness and usefulness of life. We tender to his widow and relatives our very sincere sympathy in their bereavement. Mr Roche was a member of an old Doneraile family. The date of the funeral has not yet been fixed.
