CLARE WILL CASES.

On Tuesday, at Nisi Prius, before the Lord Chief Justice and a city special jury, the probate case of O'Dea and another v. O'Neill was listed for hearing. The plaintiffs, the Very Rev Canon O'Dea, President of the Ennis Diocesan College, and Mr McMahon, a merchant in Ennis, sought, as executors, to have established the will, dated 18th January, 1916, of the late Mrs Julia Ann Curtin, who died on 14th July, 1916. The defendant, who resides in Brooklyn, U.S.A., is a grand-nephew of the deceased, and he contested the will on the usual statutory grounds.

When the case was called it was stated that a settlement had been arrived at subject to the will being proved.

Mr Macnamara, Solicitor, Ennis, was examined and deposed to the testamentary capacity of the deceased lady to the due execution of the will. The assets amounted to about £6,500.

The jury, by direction, found in favour of the will, which was admitted to probate.
