He thought a shilling a stone was a good price for potatoes, and advocated the formation of a Consumers' League to protect the citizens from profiteers. (Hear, hear.) They had been waiting for the City Fathers to give a lead in the matter, but apparently they were ashamed to do it, or had not realised the gravity of the

Mr J J Harrison thought action should also be taken in the matter of regulating the sugar supply of the city.

It was decided that every effort should be made to keep up the supply of potatoes in the market, and that the price should not at any time exceed one shilling a stone, the retailer to be allowed twopence extra.
