SERIOUS ACCIDENT AVERTED.

A few days ago a serious, if not fatal accident, was averted through the prompt action taken by a witness of the occurrence. A man named O'Loughlen was engaged cleaning windows on the third storey of a large establishment in George-street, when the guard gave way, and to prevent his falling from such a height he fortunately was able to catch with one hand the bar on a level with the sill. Mr M O'Sullivan, County Council Offices, who was passing into the establishment, saw O'Loughlen's perilous position, and promptly rushed upstairs with another man, Mr F Guinane, who assisted, both arriving in good time to the rescue. But for their intervention so speedily O'Loughlen would in all probability have been fatally injured by the fall which he narrowly escaped. They certainly deserve great credit for their timely aid over the accident.
