DEATH OF MR T. RYAN, V.S.

It is with feelings of regret we announce the
death of Mr Timothy Ryan, Veterinary Surgeon,
which occurred yesterday morning at his residence,
Jasmine Villas. The deceased, who had attained
his forty-fourth year, took ill on Sunday last.
Pneumonia supervened, and despite the best
medical and nursing care he passed away in the
early hours of yesterday morning. He was eldest
son of the late Mr Denis Ryan, Cappanuke Cottage,
Murroe, and after leaving Crescent College he went
to the Edinburgh University, where he obtained
his degree. In 1896 he returned to Limerick,
where he followed his profession ever since with a
great degree of success. He was Veterinary In-
spector to the County Borough Council, Limerick
No 1 District Council, and also to the County
Council, and enjoyed the confidence of these
bodies by his attention to duty. Among a host of
friends his demise in the prime of life is very
generally mourned, and the keenest sympathy is
extended to his widow and young family in the
irreparable loss they have sustained.

The remains will be taken to St Michael's R.C
Church at 8 o'clock this evening, and the funeral
will leave at 2 o'clock (new time) to-morrow for
Arlington, via Barrington's Bridge.
