Unionist Ulster to Appoint Delegates.
 The Ulster Unionist Council decided yesterday,
 with only four dissentients out of a delegation of
 about 350, to accept the Government's invitation
 to take part in the proposed Irish Convention,
 Sir Edward Carson, it is understood, making it
 clear that under no circumstances could Ulster, in
 view of the repeated declarations, be coerced into
 acceptance of any solution to which they were
 opposed. The proceedings were private. Sir
 Edward Carson presided.
