## IRISH FOOD COMMITTEE.

The usual weekly meeting was held in the hall on Tuesday. Alderman McNeice presided.

There were also present—Councillor Messrs P O'Donnell, and M Danaher (Council), P Cussen, C Kennelly, M A S O'Mara, J Halpin, J Harrison, J Den, Hon. Sec.

Letters of apology were read from Council-riffin, and Messrs J Carr and J Buckner (Council).

Communications were read from the Ministry and Tea Control Committee, etc. Like other supplies, the Committee find that tea being sold in the city at more reasonable prices and the Secretary was directed to ascertain the cause.

A resolution was passed calling on the Government to appoint without delay an Irish Food Controller or Committee to regulate supplies and as the regulations fixed by the late Government inflicted great hardship on the Irish especially the workers, and caused a great waste of money and food. Copies of the resolution were ordered to be sent to the Minister, Ald Joyce, M.P., and Ald Byrne, Dublin.

The Hon Secretary gave an account of the discussion between the Food Controller's representative and himself. Amongst other matters, questions enquired as to the quality of bread supplied by the war flour. The Secretary informed him that some of the bread supplied was inferior and caused wastage. He also asked for the size of the loaves, and the Secretary replied upon him that a one-pound loaf was
