Three Men Injured.

While engaged in blasting operations in a
quarry at Coolyree, Newcastle West, on Tuesday
evening, three men named Buckley, Field, and
Mullins, were seriously injured. It appears that
after the drilling and fusing had been completed
the men returned to see if the current was
properly connected, and while doing so the charge
in one of the drills went off. As a result Field
had one of his legs blown clean away, and the
others were seriously injured in the head. They
were promptly attended by Drs Pegum and
Cremin, Newcastle West, and subsequently re-
moved to the Newcastle District Hospital.
Buckley and Field are employees of the County
Council, and Mullins, is a chauffeur.

widow and family to mourn his death.
