Porters of the Sinn Fein candidate, Mr Edilea, continued their campaign in different parts of the constituency. Mr Sean Milroy having journeyed from Dublin to address meetings at Tulla and Scariff.

A number of Sinn Fein sympathisers motored the Limerick direction through Ennis on Saturday. No movement was, however, made in furtherance of Mr De Valera's candidature, fifty extra constables have been drafted in, where perfect quiet prevails, as indeed is part of the constituency.

Sinn Fein Canvass.

Ennis Correspondent, writing on Saturday, - Already the Sinn Fein party have instituted a vigorous canvass, and as political organisation on the other side has, owing to the long time since there has been a contested election, become rather lax, they have a certain advantage in the early start. There are indications, however, that Mr Lynch's party will be pressed forward from now on with increased earnestness.

ious Contests in East Clare

In 1892 the late Major Redmond was elected standard-bearer of the Parvellite Party in East Clare against the sitting member, Mr Joe Redmond, so a very popular member. It was Saturday (Record) a bit-contested election, and exciting scenes acted in various parts of the constituency, as rival parties came into collision. Prominent among these scenes was the battle of Scariff, Mr Redmond's entrance into the town, attended by big contingents from Ennis and other towns. He was hotly opposed, and there was a bitter struggle. Mr Redmond showed himself possessed of great pluck and bravery, and enhanced his popularity. At the poll he had a majority of 446, the figures being—

was a petition lodged by Mr Cox, which was presented at the Ennis Courthouse by Mr Justice O'Brien and Mr Justice Johnson, and after a hearing, and a host of witnesses having examined, the petition was dismissed. At the next election, in 1895, there was another contested struggle, a very popular candidate, Pat A. McHugh, of Sligo, coming to Clare's favourite. Both sides put forth all efforts, and once again the Nationalists stood staunchly by Mr Redmond, but they were brought down to 58, the figures being—

some dust-dry. When watering, water thoroughly, so that the water from the drainage-holes at the bottom of the plants really need it. Frequent cause many losses of plants. Of course need less water during their resting at that time most bulbous plants may dry, or practically so.

Artificial manures of reliable brands useful for potted plants; and of natural manure is probably best. A bucket mixed with 100 gallons of water makes liquid manure, and can be used for tender plants when they are in need. The stronger the plants, the more they can take; and for plants of rank liquid may be gradually increased up to three times the strength mentioned.

Well managed hanging baskets are extremely decorative, but some provis made to prevent their too rapid drying. Living the basket with moss is a good idea where this is done open wire baskets for growing plants. The earth should be proportion of good garden loam and mould, thus making it as retentive of moisture under the circumstances, should be hung in light positions, but they will be exposed to either direct to drying winds. The best way of water baskets is to sink them in a pail or tub for a time.
