Sinn Fein Canvass.

Ennis Correspondent, writing on Saturday, says:—Already the Sinn Fein party have instituted a vigorous canvass, and as political organization on the other side has, owing to the long interval since there has been a contested election, become rather lax, they have a certain advantage in the early start. There are indications however, that Mr Lynch's candidature will be pressed forward from now on with a heartier earnestness.

Previous Contests in East Clare

In 1892 the late Major Redmond was elected standard-bearer of the Parcellite Party in the constituency against the sitting member, Mr Joe Ryan, so a very popular member. It was (Saturday Record recalls) a bit-contested election, and exciting scenes were acted in various parts of the constituency, as rival parties came into collision. Prominent among these scenes was the battle of Scariff. Mr Redmond's entrance into the town, attended by big contingents from Ennis and other parts, was hotly opposed, and there was a bitter struggle. Mr Redmond showed himself possessed of considerable pluck and bravery, and enhanced his popularity. At the poll he had a majority of 446, the figures being—

...was a petition lodged by Mr Cox, which was dismissed at the Ennis Courthouse by Mr Justice Johnson, and after a hearing, and a host of witnesses having been examined, the petition was dismissed. At the ensuing election, in 1895, there was another bit-contested struggle, a very popular candidate, Mr Pat A. McHugh, of Sligo, coming to Ennis as the people's favourite. Both sides put forth their best efforts, and once again the Nationalists stood staunchly by Mr Redmond, but his candidature was brought down to 58, the figures being—

...some dust-dry. When watering, water thoroughly, so that the water from the drainage-holes at the bottom and then withhold water until the soil the plants really need it. Frequent watering cause many losses of plants. Of course need less water during their resting at that time most bulbous plants may dry, or practically so.

Artificial manures of reliable brand useful for potted plants; and of manure is probably best. A barrel mixed with 100 gallons of water makes a liquid manure, and can be used for tenderest plants when they are in need. The stronger the plants, the more they can take; and for plants of rank liquid may be gradually increased in to thrice the strength mentioned.

Well managed hanging baskets of extremely decorative, but some provision made to prevent their too rapid cooling. Lining the basket with moss is a good where this is done open wire baskets for growing plants. The earth should be a proportion of good garden loam and peat, thus making it as retentive of moisture as practicable under the circumstances. Baskets should be hung in light positions, but they will be exposed to either direct sun or drying winds. The best way of watering baskets is to sink them in a pail or tub for a time.
