This afternoon the annual distribution of prizes to the pupils attending Laurel Hill Convent Schools took place at the institution, in presence of a large gathering of the relatives and friends of the prize-winners. The Bishop, Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer, had intended to make the presentation, but was unable to be present owing to the death of the Rev M. Byrne, Parish Priest of Drom-collogher, whose funeral took place to-day. His lordship's place in presiding at the re-union was accordingly taken by the Rev J O'Connor, Adm, St Michael's, who proved an admirable substitute, and discharged the duty in a manner that was most acceptable to the pupils and their people. The other clergymen present included-- Rev F Dolan, C.C, St Munchin's College; Very Rev Father Leo, Rector Redemptorists; Rev F O'Flynn, C.S.S.R.; Rev F Fallon, S.J. In addition to a most interesting display of work executed by the pupils, at the easel, with the needle, work for use or ornament, a very entertaining musical and literary programme was prepared, and proved very enjoyable to the listeners. Piano duets and a violin quartette were played by youthful performers. Choruses were sung in Irish and in English, and very sweetly they appealed. There was a very nice recitation by Miss Graham, who gave *le solo de flute* trippingly, but perfect in pronunciation, as one outside of France can hope to pronounce that lovely language, and with a grace that was very taking. There was dancing too. The audience had a number of other fetching items, and then the prizes were distributed by Father O'Connor, who thanked the Sisters and their pupils for the treat provided in the programme, conducted as the entertainment was by Mr C Kendal Irwin.

DEATH OF MR JOSEPH HALL.
