 culture and Technical Instruction for Ireland  
 (Veterinary Branch), 50 and 51 Upper Mount  
 street, Dublin, and except in the case of a race-  
 horse, when a shorter period may suffice, each  
 application should reach the Department not less  
 than six days before the date on which it may be  
 desired to ship the animal in the event of the ex-  
 portation being permitted, so that time may be  
 afforded for the needful inquiries in the matter.
