The annual conference of the M of Great Britain opened to-day in Mr Robert Smillie, in his address expressed the hope that the Government's policy of curtailing the coal output would be a step towards a more equitable distribution. The miners were emphatic in their expression of the fact that the Government should place mine owners at least pre-war profits on at least an equal footing. The Government should assent to any proposal for the settlement by negotiation before opening the Conference would consider the substantial increase of wages over the coalfields to meet the increased prices. The Government ought to have a more liberal policy towards the miners. Mr Smillie advocated that the Government should regard the miners as a loyal trade-unionist who stuck like a man to his own class. The speaker believed that the miners would work out her own salvation.
