# HOUSE RENTS IN WAR TIMES.

The Courts Emergency Powers Act, 1917, which recently received the Royal Assent, has made two amendments in the Increase of Rent and Mortgage Interest (War Restrictions) Act, 1915, which are of interest to tenants of houses to which the latter Act applies. A tenant can now recover from the landlord any amount paid in excess of the standard rent fixed by the Act- of 1915, and irrecoverable under that Act, at auv time within six months from the payment, or from the 10th July, 1917, if the excess was paid before that date, and he may, without prejudice to any other method of recovery, deduct it from rent payable during such six months.
