DEATH OF MR MICHAEL DONNELLY.

The death took place last night, somewhat un expectedly, after a long illness, at his residence, Parnell street, of Mr Michael Donnelly, who for a period of thirty years and more oc-cupied a prominent position in local public affairs. Mr Donnelly, who had attained a good old age, was a member of the Limerick Corporation. He represented the Irishtown Ward as Alderman previous to the passing of the Local Government Act, and it was not until the year 1911 that he ceased to represent that Ward and passed into private life. He filled the office of Mayor two years in succession, the years 1903 and 1904, as memory serves, and he it was who, while Chief Magistrate of the City and official head of the Corporation, publicly entertained Mr Andrew Carnegie on his visit to Limerick in connection with the ceremonial of the opening of the Carnegie Library at the People's Park. Mr Donnelly was a Nationalist in politics of the Constitutionalist type, he discharged his public duties uprightly and with due regard to the interest of the ratepayers, and he was held in much esteem by a large circle of friends who, however they might differ with him in details, political or municipal, could not withdraw regard from one who, in whatever he took a hand, always strove to act conscientiously and to the best of his understanding.
