# More Raids on London.

ON SATURDAY AND SUNDAY NIGHTS.

# Many Killed and Injured.

There were enemy air raids on London on Saturday and Sunday nights.

A later communique from Lord French relative to baturday night says :--

Latest reports show that a determined and simultaneous attack was made upon London by three groups of raiders.

Fach of these groups, which approached from different directions, was boken up by anti-aircraft are, and only two, at most three, machines penetrated the defences.

Bombs were dropped in the north-eastern and south-eastern districts.

A fourth group of enemy machines which attempted to approach London later was driven off, mone of the raiders penetrating the outer defences of the capital. Bombs were also dropped at various places in Kent and Essex.

Full reports of casualties and damage have not yet been received, but both are believed to be comparatively light. (LATER).

## Sunday Night's Raid.

The following communique was issued by Field-Marshal Commanding-in-Chief, Home Forces, at 9.30 p.m on Sunday evening:—

Two groups of chemy machines, followed by others flying singly, crossed the Kent and Essex coast between \$.40 p.m and \$ p.m (Sunday). They came towards London. About ten penetrated the outer defences, but only four or five got through to London itself.

Bombs are reported to have been dropped in Kent and Essex, and also in London.

No details as to casualties or damage have yet been received.

## Economic Position After War,

## Inter-Allied Conference.

The Executive of the Inter-Allied Parliamentary Conference is to meet in Paris on the 12th of this menth to consider the resolutions on the economic position after the war, which are to be brought before the Inter-Allied Conference in London next year. Mr. W Watson Rutherford, M.P., one of the keenest supporters of the full use by the Allies of the economic weapon, has already given notice of motions on the subject. For the first time, practically all the Allies will be represented at the London Conference. There will be present Parliamentary representatives of Great Britain, France, Belgium, Italy, Russia, Serbia, Portugal, Rumania, and Japan. Arrangements are also being made for the attendance of repre-sentatives from the United States, and possibly from China. The last conference in the conference of the confere from Chins. The Chairman, in putting the proposition to accept the Roxboro delegates as members of the Executive, said he was very pleased with the progress that was being made, but was far from being satisfied until every man who was willing to handle a spade had a plot. It was gratifying to learn that Limerick was alive in the matter, but still they were far behind other cities in this respect. There were upwards of 8,000 plots already in Belfast on the volutary system, but then that scheme was started close on five years. Whilst the voluntary system was the most desirable, it would also be desirable to have the power to acquire land, if necessary.

A letter was read by the Chairman from Miss S C Harrison re the proposed All-Ireland Conference of Plotholders, and contained the suggestion that the principles of the Scottish Allotment Bill would, if applied to Ireland, be of a

The Chairman said if they were satisfied with the suggestions contained in the communication he was prepared to see that they were carried into

The Secretary proposed a resolution to that effect, which Mr M O'Donnell seconded, and it was passed unanimonaly.

On the question of delegates, the Chairman said he would wish to have a plotholder with him to travel, as he felt certain that no amount of theory could supply the place of the actual man on the spot, who was able to give first hand information as to the value of the produce of his plot.
