On Saturday evening the Chief Secretary was interviewed by the Lord Mayor, who was empowered to state that special provisions had been granted by the Privy Council that day for the classification of the Defence of the Realm prisoners, and regulations were made which deal with the following subjects:—

Interviews, occupation, correspondence, general treatment, prisoners allowed to mix with each other, and not in any way to be treated as a criminal class. Special regulations were also made as to food supplies, which can be brought to the prisoners from outside.

On Saturday evening two of the hunger strikers named Griffey and Barry were removed from Mountjoy to the Mater Hospital in a weak condition. They were attended by Dr Dempsey, Merion Square, and Dr M'Kenna, House Physician. Barry was able to walk up the steps from the ambulance but Griffey had to be carried on a stretcher. It is stated that both men, who had been discharged under the "Cat and Mouse Act" are ordered to report themselves back on December 1st.
