## Roll of Honour.

### Lieut. J F C Fogerty.

Lieutenant John Frederick Cullinan Fogerty, R.E., elder son of Mr W H Fogerty, solr, Bank Place, Ennis, was educated at Galway Grammar School, where he took many prizes and Exhibitions. He passed thence into the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich, in February, 1915, and obtained his commission in the Royal Engineers in October of that year. He had been on active service since July, 1916, had just been promoted first lieutenant, and only returned to duty from sick leave a week before his death in action, on Tuesday last, in his 22nd year. His Major writes—"His death occurred whilst returning from the line, having just executed a piece of work which entailed a good deal of courage and skill. He was one of my best officers, and will be a great loss to my company. He was always cheery, and a keen, reliable officer, beloved by both his brother officers and men."

### Limerick Captain Killed at the Front.

Our Glin correspondent writes:—Profound sorrow is manifested by all in Glin at the news of the death, on the 20th September, in action of Captain Joseph P Pegum, R.A.M.C., on the Western Front, and the greatest sympathy is extended to the members of his family. The gallant deceased was the youngest son of the late Mr James Pegum, of Cahara House, Glin, and brother of Mr Thomas E Pegum, J.P. Their brother, Lieutenant Stephen Pegum, 4th Munsters, was badly wounded in action some months back.

### Crisis in Germany

The German Nationalists have started a diversion, says the "Daily Telegraph," by issuing a pitiful appeal to all Germans in Austria to hold out for peace without compromise, peace with secure frontiers. In other words, no concessions to Serbia, Italy, or Rumania, and for strong military frontiers. This, they urge, is the only way of recompensing the Germans of Austria for their heavy war sacrifices.

For two days there have been serious rumours of a Ministerial crisis. The German Nationalists are indifferent. They would prefer to be without a Parliament, and without a Ministry, leaving the Government simply in the hands of the young Kaiser, with some Chancellor assuming the role of dictator. A climax has been reached by the Budget Committee refusing, by twenty-six votes to fourteen, to approve the Budget, and thereby making Dr von Seidler's position and that of the Government impossible.
