

ULSTER BANK AMALGAMATION

Belfast,

The second amalgamation of an Ulster bank with one of the leading banking houses in London is announced. The Ulster Bank, Ltd., the most prosperous of the Irish banks, has entered into an amalgamation arrangement with the London County and Westminster Bank. The terms of the amalgamation scheme have not so far been disclosed, but it is understood generally, they will follow the lines of the amalgamation scheme by means of the transfer of shares effected between the Belfast Bank and the London City and Midland Bank. The advantages of the scheme will be apparent to the trading community, who will be enabled to command larger resources for after-war trade requirements.

FRUIT PRESERVING WITHOUT SUGAR.

Choose sound dry fruits, place in glass bottles or jars. Place these in slow steam and gradually increase heat until moisture is absorbed, (about 15 minutes). Then put in boiling water to half inch above fruit. Boil for 10 minutes. Drain off water. Put in a hot oven by pouring on half an inch melted "A" Beef Suet. Do not disturb until set.
