ITALIAN MINISTRY RESIGNS.

A Reuter's Rome telegram states that the re-
jection by 314 votes to 93 of the first portion of
the Order of the day in the Italian Chamber on
Thursday, which the Government made a question
of confidence, has been officially brought to the
notice of the Government.

A telegram dated Friday, 3.50 p.m says—In
the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon Signor
Boselli announced the resignation of the Cabinet.
The sittings of the Chamber were adjourned
pending the solution of the crisis.

Speaking of the Papal Note to the belligerents
Baron Sonnino, Minister of Foreign Affairs,
emphasised the fact that it was impossible not to
agree with what the Pope had said as regards the
benefits that would accrue from peace, and as to
the measures of a general order to be adopted
after the war by the society of nations to prevent
the recurrence of an immense conflict. But, he
added, that when one examined the Papal Note
in its definite suggestions as to the conditions of
peace one could find in it no practical proposals,
any more than in the speeches of Dr Michaelis,
Baron von Kuehlmann, and Count Czernin Baron
Sonnino said the part of the Papal Note which
called for examination into territorial questions,
and took note of the aspirations of nations, con-
stituted the most important and original passage,
but it did not offer a practical basis for negoti-
ations, and Count Czernin and Baron von Kuehl-
mann replied to it with a "No, never." We are
ready, the Minister proceeded, to consider, in
accord with our Allies, any serious proposal for
peace, without any spirit of revenge or hatred, of
conquest or of Imperialism

Limerick Guardsman Killed

News reached the city on Thursday of the death
in action in France on the 9th inst of Private
Daniel O'Sullivan, 1st battalion of the Irish
Guards. The deceased was son of Mr M S
O'Sullivan, late Governor of H M Prison, Lime-
rick, with whom the greatest sympathy is felt in
the loss of a gailant and fearless soldier. The late
Private O'Sullivan, who was a keen exponent of
soccer, joined the Army some eighteen months
ago, and was through some of the hottest engage-
ments in the Western theatre of war. He has at
present two brothers in the Army, Michael and
Patrick, and a third is a wireless operator in the
service, while a sister is a trained nurse in a large
war hospital.
