It is estimated that Ireland's wheat acreage in 1917 is not sufficient to supply the country's needs for more than only about two months, and that there is a serious shortage in the supply of breadstuffs, owing to the necessity for a special effort to extend the area under wheat this year. The prospective shortage and the protective price now guaranteed for wheat will give an incentive to the cultivation of this crop on a large scale.
