SALE OF SUGAR IN IRELAND.

Registration of Retailers

The registration of all retailers of sugar in Ireland is required by Order of the Food Controller just issued, similar in purport to the Sugar (Registration of Retailers) Order, 1917, in force in Great Britain. Applications for certificates of registration must be made before November 18th, and it will be illegal to deal in sugar by retail without a certificate after December 4th.
