A wide circle of friends in Limerick and the adjoining counties will regret to learn of the death of Mr Richard Keays, which took place yesterday at his residence in Cahircornish. He had been in failing health for months back, and passed away at an advanced age. Mr Keays came of a very old and highly esteemed County Limerick family, and was one of the biggest farmers in the county. He was a big cattle breeder, and carried on dairying extensively. He was very popular with all classes and creeds, and sincere sympathy is extended to his widow and sons in their bereavement. The funeral will take place to-morrow (Sunday) at one o'clock for the family burial place at Abington.

DEATH OF MR D LEAHY, SOLR.

We regret to announce the death of Mr Daniel Leahy, solr. which occurred in St John's Hospital yesterday after a somewhat protracted illness. The deceased gentleman was in his sixty-fourth year, and was admitted to the solicitors' profession in 1878 after a distinguished course. He took up practice in his native town of Abbeyfeale and engaged an extensive clientele who had the utmost confidence in his ability and integrity.
