CORPORATION WATER COMMITTEE.

Increases of Salary.

At a meeting of the Corporation Water Committee last night, the Mayor presiding, an increase of 10s a week was granted to Mr Thos O'Connell, Superintendent of the Water Works, and 3s weekly to Mr James Taylor, engineman at Clareville Works, in consequence of his having to work on Sundays. The Secretary to the Water Committee, Mr M F Donnellan was granted a war bonus of £20 a year, bringing his salary up to £210 a year.
