ROLL OF HONOUR.

Captain Gleeson.

We regret to state that intelligence has been received by his relatives in Limerick of the death of a gallant soldier in the person of Captain John Gleeson, Royal Munster Fusiliers, who died on Saturday in a London hospital from wounds received in action. Captain Gleeson, who was but 27, joined the ranks of the Munsters on the formation of the 16th Irish Division, and saw much service, being awarded the Military Cross for valour some fifteen months since. Previous to joining the Army he served at engineering, and was given commissioned rank shortly after going abroad. The deceased was wounded in November last year, the injuries proving fatal. Captain Gleeson was son of the late Mr David Gleeson, a highly esteemed overseer in the Limerick Telegraph Department, and was a great favourite.

The Funeral.

The remains of the late Captain John F Gleeson, R.M.F., arrived in Limerick this morning at 11 o'clock. At the terminus there was a large concourse of people awaiting the train, and when the coffin was removed from the mortuary carriage some touching scenes were witnessed. The deceased, who won his commission for gallantry in the field was of a very engaging disposition, and his death at the age of twenty-seven years has occasioned widespread sympathy in the city, where he was well-known and highly esteemed. The interment took place in Mount St Lawrence Cemetery, the officiating clergy being the Rev Fr Drane, Adm, St Michael's; Rev Fr Carroll, C.C. do, and Rev Fr Hannan, C.C. do.

The chief mourners were—Mrs D Gleeson (mother); Mrs P Miles and Miss F Gleeson (sisters); Mr P Miles (brother-in-law); Mr R Walsh, Mr P Walsh, B.C., Mr M Walsh (uncles), and Mrs Hasleton (aunt).

Included in the cortege were a number of the Post Office staff, of which the father of the deceased, the late Mr D Gleeson, was a member for many years.

Major R Gregory, R.F.C.

The death in action is reported of Major Robert Gregory, R.F.C., only son of the late Sir William Gregory, K.C.B., and of Lady Gregory. He was a frequent exhibitor in connection with the New English Art Club, and examples of his work, including an excellent painting of the family seat in county Galway, are to be found in the Municipal Art Gallery, Dublin. He held the record as champion light-weight boxer during his student days at Oxford. He leaves a wife and three children.

Captain W B Cronyn.
