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The prisoner asked no question, reiterating that he did not recognise the Court.

Mr Daly—What is this man's character?

Sergeant Keily—There are forty convictions already recorded against him for drunkenness and disorderly conduct, assault, larceny, and cruelty to his children.

The prisoner was fined 40s, or in default one month's imprisonment for obstruction, and 10s, or in default seven days, for drunkenness.

There was a third charge against Carriek for assaulting Sergeant Rahill on the same date at the Markets Field.

In his evidence the sergeant stated that he was on duty at the Markets Field on the afternoon of the 16th instant, the occasion of a football match between the Welsh Fusiliers and the King's Own Scottish Borderers. He was playing an illegal game—the three-card trick game—and had an accomplice with him. He was told to move on, and refused. In consequence of his conduct he was removed, and in doing so he struck the witness.

For this offence he was sent to prison for two months with hard labour, and on the application of District Inspector Craig he was also bound, to the peace in £5 and two sureties of £2 10s each, or in default an additional two months in gaol.

Patrik McNamara was charged by Acting-sergeant Corry with assaulting him on the 16th instant.

The acting-sergeant stated that the accused was with Carriek at the Markets Field on the same occasion, and in the game of the three-card trick he was acting as his accomplice. When called upon to move he struck the acting-sergeant on the chest.

The defendant was sentenced to a month's imprisonment with hard labour.

The Court adjourned.

DEATH OF MR F O'CONNOR.

The death, which has been greatly regretted, took place last week at his residence, the Island Road, of Mr Frank O'Connor, at an early age. The deceased, who was third son of the late Mr F O'Connor, was a general favourite, and highly respected by a wide circle of friends. The funeral which took place on Thursday, the 14th instant, from St Mary's R.C Church for the family burial place at St Munchin's, was largely attended, and testified to the esteem and respect in which the deceased was held in the city, and the sympathy extended to the family in their bereavement.
