It appears rom a statistical table that the total numper of deaths from the principal epidemic liseases was 746, equivalent to an annual ate of 0 69 per 1,000 living, and it is very natisfactory to observe that the mortality was 363, or 0|33 per 1,000, under the werage for the third quarter of the five years preceding. The number of deaths rom tuberculosis disease, as returned by the Registrars, was 2.076, being 32 above the iverage (2,044) for the corresponding quarter of the five years 1912-16, and representing in annual rate of 191 per 1,000 of the population, as against rates of 1.66, 2.40, and 2.65 respectively for the three preceding juarters. Until the housing question is ractically solved in our cities and towns. ind which, there is a prospect, will be the ase after the war, this dread disease will loubtless continue to claim many victims lwelling in wretched abodes and amidst usanitary surroundings. There were 808 leaths from cancer during the quarter, being 4 under the average for the third quarter if the five years 1912-16, which is a satisactory feature. The number of emigrants rho left Ireland during the quarter ras only 579, due, no doubt, to war onditions, but it is gratifying to note hat the number is 1,829 less than in he corresponding quarter of the year 1916, nd 5,858 below the average number for the hird quarter of the ten years 1907-1916. his year the further extension of tillage in reland, essential as it is in the interests of he people and the Nation, should materially and to further stay the emigration drain, ecause there will be plenty of employment or the horney-handed sons of toil, both at he time of sowing and reaping. In the ionths of July, August, and September but 6, 92, and 68 males, respectively, emigrated, ectively, for the corresponding period of 916, while the comparison as regards males is more noteworthy still, the numers being 121, 119, and 113 for the harvest onths of 1917, as against 422, 407, and 157 for 1916. The meterological notes mind us that for the whole quarter under tice, that is to the 30th September last, s temperature was hearly la above the rmal in both the north and south, while total duration of bright sunshine was ghtly above in the north and a little below in the south, the mean per day being hr. in each district. The total rainfall is in excess very generally. In the north percentage of the normal was 111, and the south 132. Such a large excess ring the third quarter has not been exrienced for many years.

#### DEATH OF MR. W. T. ORMSTON.
