#### The Agricultural Hall.

Yesterday Messrs Kbrill Bros, Auctioneers, held their usual weekly sale of garden produce. There was a fair supply of late-keeping apples and parsnips and other vegetables, and a large quantity of spring flowers. There was a good attendance at the sale and satisfactory prices were realised. We notice that the sale next week will be held on Wednesday, owing to Friday being Good Friday. The following are some of the prices:— Cauliflowers, 1s 8d to 2s 2d per doz; cabbage, 8d to 10d per doz; parsley, 8d to 10d per doz; parsnips, 7d to 8d per stone; leeks, 4d to 6d per doz; sea-kale, 8d to 11d per lb; rhubarb, 8d to 10d per doz; hen eggs, 2s 9d to 3s per doz; duck eggs, 2s 11d to 3s 1d per doz; flowers, 3d to 7d per bunch; apples, 1s 4d to 2s 3d per doz; hens, 3s to 4s each.

### THE REPOSITORY LIMERICK.

#### Weekly Cattle Sale To-day.

Trade was very satisfactory to-day, at Mr O'Brien's weekly cattle sale. The entry of store cattle was small, but in all other branches was satisfactory. All lots of incalf heifers, dairy cows, and calves were sold to eager purchasers at prices which pleased all vendors. Incalf heifers £35 15s to £30 and £27 15s to £24. Best dairy cows £39 to £34; second class £29 to £23; strip- per £16 to £13 10s; heifer calves £8 2s 6d to £1 7s 6d; bullock calves £7 15s to £6 5s. Four working horses were sold for the following prices, 22 gns, 18 gns, 17 1/2 gns and 16 gns.

### HOUSING PROBLEM IN IRELAND.

Mr A W Samuels, in reply to Ald Byrne in Parliament, said the Chief Secretary was at present considering Mr Cowan's report on the Dublin housing problem; and to Capt Sheehan he said he hoped shortly to circulate a report on housing in Ireland.

### SUGAR FOR JAM-MAKING.

Lord Rhoads hopes to allocate this year about 10,000 tons (possibly more) of sugar for jam-making to fruit growers. The issue would be at the rate of 10lbs per head of the household, or more where the Committee considered desirable, but the surplus must be placed at the disposal of the Committee at current prices for public consumption. The present stock of sugar was satisfactory.
