RISH QUESTIONS.

House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Lyson Wilson that complaints had been received from the Irish Post Office Clerks relating to the senior superintendent of the office towards the assistant superintendents, and staff under his control; and they had generally proved to be exaggerated or devoid of foundation. He proposed to remove the officer to other duties, especially as he was approaching retirement.

Mr. King, replying to Major Davies, said the agricultural training and land settlement being developed by the Minister of the Department of Agriculture, the Department of the Colonies, were being in the closest co-operation with the Government.

Mr. King—Will the Prime Minister be here on Tuesday?

Mr. King—I hope so—it will depend upon circumstances.

IRISH RECRUITING.

House of Commons on Tuesday.

Mr. Newman asked the Under Secretary of War whether, having regard to the work of recruiting in Ireland is to be done by voluntary effort, it is proposed to have the services of officers and non-commissioned officers who have hitherto undertaken military duty, and to hand over the various recruiting offices to the local civilian Recruiting Officers, which are being raised.

Mr. Newman said he was afraid the proposal of Major Newman was not practicable, necessary to retain that personnel, which would be responsible, as in the past, for reception, enlistment, and posting of recruits.

RAILWAYMEN'S CONFERENCE.

Food Distribution.

At the resumed conference of the National Union of Railwaymen yesterday at Edinburgh, three resolutions were discussed. The first demanded the Government control and distribution of food. The second asked for permanent and generous provision for every injured or incapacitated sailor and soldier and dependants. The third protested against the suppression of freedom of speech under the Defence of the Realm Act, reaffirmed opposition to military conscription, and declared industrial conscription unnecessary.

Mr. W. Hudson, M.P., warmly testified to the good work of the Ministry of Food, but complained that local committees had no sympathy with co-operators.

Mr. R. Watson claimed to speak from personal knowledge of the way food had been allowed to rot in Liverpool.

Mr. E. Wenlock (Stratford) referred to the arrest of Sinn Feiners, and said that unless they were careful some Labour leaders would find themselves in the same position.

The resolutions were adopted.
