REPORTED OUTRAGE NEAR TOURNAFULLA.

Constable Fired At.

A report reached Limerick to-day that last
night at Tournafulla, near Newcastle-west, Con-
stable James Lyons was fired at and wounded.
No particulars were available up to a late hour
other than that County Inspector Yates left by
the forenoon train to investigate the circumstances
of the outrage. The Constabulary are stated to
have been boycotted in the locality for some time
past.

THE LATE LIEUT J M TIDMARSH.

The funeral of the late Lieut J M Tidmarsh,
Duke of Wellington's Regiment and R.A.F., will
take place from St Muncin's Parish Church on
Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock to Mount St
Lawrence Cemetery.

Mr Shortt, Chief Secretary, has addressed copies
of the following letter to Colonel Edgeworth
Johnstone, Chief Commissioner of the Dublin
Metropolitan Police, and General Sir Joseph
Byrne, Inspector-General of the Royal Irish Con-
stabulary:—

Dub'ic Castle, 5th September, 1918.

The Lord Lieutenant and I have given careful
consideration to the case which you have put for-
ward on behalf of the members of your force. We
are satisfied that you have shown good ground
for a substantial rise both in the amount of pay
and in the amount of the widows' pension. As was
the case in 1914 and 1916, the rise in pay and
pension can only be obtained by Act of Parliam-
ent, but we are taking the necessary steps to
bring the matter forward, and will do our utmost
to press it to a successful conclusion. We think
it would be fair that any increase which we may
be able to obtain should be retrospective, and
should date as from the 1st of September.—Yours

In view of the foregoing letter, a meeting which
was convened for Thursday evening at Kevin
street Barracks, Dublin, with the sanction of the
Chief Commissioner of the Dublin Metropolitan
Police, was not held.

CLAIM OF ASYLUM WORKERS.

At a special meeting of the Limerick Asylum
Workers a demand for an eight-hours working
day and an increase of £1 a week on pre-war
wages was adopted, and notification to this effect
has been forwarded to the Committee of Manage-
ment of the Asylum. Failing a satisfactory
settlement, the workers state that they will have
no other course open to them but to withdraw
their services.

The Council of the Limerick United Trades
and Labour Council have passed a resolution
pledging support of the Asylum employes' claims,
and urging the Board to grant them their just
and reasonable demands.

DUBLIN HOTEL STRIKE ENDED.

The hotel strike is at an end. The wages
question is to be submitted to arbitration, and
there is to be no victimisation on either side. It
is announced that a general resumption of activities
in the hotels and restaurants will take place on
Monday.

DEATH OF MR MICHAEL CAHILL.

The death occurred to-day at his residence,
Thomas-street, of Mr Michael Cahill, a well-
known citizen, and who had been for a long time
part engaged in the tobacco manufacturing in-
dustry. Mr Cahill was all but half a century in
the business, and proved himself one in whom his
customers had every confidence for fair and con-
siderate treatment of their interests. He was also
a director of the Limerick Race Company, and his
death at the age of 72 will be deeply felt by his
relatives, with whom there is much sympathy at
the loss they have sustained. The funeral takes
place from St. Michael's Parochial Church on
Monday, at 11.15 a.m. after Office and Requiem
Mass for the deceased.
