When the noisy vocalists had concluded, Sir
Maurice said—I thought that in all fairness you
would listen to what an Irishman has to say to
you. (A Voice—Who are you, and where is
Colonel Lynch?) I thought, proceeded the
speaker, you were sportsmen, and I can tell you
that I am a better Irishman than any of you.

The meeting soon after ended.
We have only to repeat in justice to the city
that the interruptions were confined to a compara-
tively few irresponsible individuals, mostly women
and boys, and in no way reflected the views of the
citizens generally on recruiting.

Postal Alterations, 1st Oct, 1918

In connection with the alteration in the hours
of sailing of the Holyhead and Kingstown Mail
boat, the following will be the new Postal arrange-
ments in the city:—

General night mail delivery (except Mondays)
will commence at 7.0 a.m.

Daily mail delivery (to Southampton, London,
South Wales, Midland and South of England)
will commence at 11.45 a.m.

Mails from Dublin, North and West of Ireland,
will be delivered at 1.50 p.m. (to callers only).

Mails from Dublin, North of England and
Scotland, will be delivered at 5.30 p.m. (in re-
stricted area only).

Except on Saturdays when the 2.45 p.m. train
will be utilised the principal day mail despatch
to London, South Wales, and South and Midlands
of England will be at 6.25 p.m. via Rosslare
(latest hour of posting at Head Office 5.0 p.m.)
Cross-Channel mails posted at the Head Office
between 5.0 p.m. and 7.30 a.m. next day will,
however, be forwarded by 8.20 a.m. train for con-
nection with the 2.30 p.m. boat from Kingstown.

Mails for Dublin, places in Ireland north of
Limerick Junction, Scotland and North of
England will continue to be forwarded by 2.45 p.m.
train.
