FURTHER DETAILS OF THE CRIME.

CRIME.

A Press Association representative who exceed to Kingstown yesterday morning says—The Royal Mail steamer passed through a considerable amount of wreakage, including a number of deck life safts and three lifeboats floating bottom upwards, relice of the ill-fated Leinster, sunk about 28 hours previously.
