French Gains Extended.

(FRENCH COMMUNIQUE.)

Paris, Thursday.

Afternoon's communique says:—The French Oise front our troops crossed the Canal of Grand Verly. In spite of enemy counter-attacks our elements maintained themselves on the eastern bank. Between the Oise and the Serre the struggle is lively. In the region of the railway line, between Mesrecourt, we have made some gains. North of Nizy Le Comte we appreciated our gains. During the night on the east of Voiziers there was great activity on the part of the opposing artillery.
