

trade concerned. Wholesale shops are not later than 5.30 on Mondays and three succeeding days; not later than on Fridays, and 9.30 p.m. on Saturdays. Matinees will be very largely done with by the regulations with respect to theatres, picture houses, and other places of entertainment, which are to be closed on not more than five days in each week between the hours of 3.30 and 5.30 o'clock, except from December 25th to the 10th January, but it is open to the Coal Controller to give special permits for the holding of any performance on such terms as he may think proper. It is important to the public to note that banks (other than Savings Banks) shall not be open for the transaction of business to a later hour than 2.30 p.m. The Order does not prevent the serving of a customer who may be in a shop before the closing hour or for the article supplied after that hour is required in a case of illness; or the sale of medicines or medical appliances, milk, motor cycle supplies, or accessories wanted for immediate use, victual stores or other necessaries for his Majesty's forces or for any person on arrival or before departure from any port, or the transaction after the closing hour of any P.O. business; and it does not affect any obligation to comply with the various Acts. The Order does not apparently interfere with lighting restrictions in private houses, but it would not be a matter of surprise if this were to come later on. Economy in the domestic sphere, though it is already considerably observed by the simpler classes, owing to the high cost of illuminants, is no doubt still further possible in other directions. That is for "Paterfamilias" to say and to judge according to his means.

The Great Munster Horse Fair was a large and busy one, perhaps the busiest for a long number of years past. There was a large supply of horses mainly of the trooper and long tail class, and the buying was on a big scale, the principal markets being well represented. The buyers included Messrs Robinson (Belfast), Widger (Waterford), Nugent (Dublin), Desmond (Cork), Driscoll (Bandon), Sheehy (Rathkeale), etc. The feature of the fair was the extensive purchases made for army purposes, and the high prices paid, over three to four hundred per cent on pre-war figures. Marriage horses of which there were not many for sale, and some animals likely to make good entries, ranged from £80 to £100. Everything worth the buying found a purchaser.
