Artificial manures will not stand wetness. They must be stored in a closed shed, having a water tight roof and should be placed on a floor to which water cannot gain socess. If the ground is perfectly dry the fertilisers may be turned out of the bags and stored in house but if there is any suspicion of the floor being damp the manures should be kept in the bags which should be placed on huriles or bundles of faggots. A good deal of winter wheat was sown during the week. In this connection it may be mentioned that the Ministry of Food have now reduced the extraction of flour from wheat to 75 per cent without any admixture.
