MR DANIEL J PORTLEY.

His many friends in Limerick will regret to
learn of the untimely death from Spanish influenza
of Mr Daniel J Portley, son of Mr John Portley,
Limerick, which took place on the 18th October,
1918, at Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A. at the early
age of 29 years. The deceased, who before his
departure for America, was well-known in Limer-
rick, had a brilliant though brief career in the
United States. He took out his degree as certifi-
ed public accountant at the Illinois University,
Chicago, in the year 1913, and, after some time,
applied himself to the study of Law, and succeeded
in being called to the Bar in June 1914. He held
administrative appointments in the Real Estate Office
of Cook County which embraces Chicago and its
environs. The deceased leaves a widow and three
children.

they rested overnight. Yesterday morning at 10
o'clock the funeral left for St Mary's. The

family in their bereavement.
