OBITUARY.

MR JOHN F O'SULLIVAN, L.D.S.

We regret to record the death, which took place at his residence, 24 Glenthworth street, on Wednesday, of Mr John F O'Sullivan, L.D.S. The deceased contracted a cold some time ago, which developed in a pneumonia, and, despite the best medical skill and nursing, had a fatal result, as stated. The cutting short of a bright and promising career is deeply mourned by a wide circle of friends in Limerick, who deeply sympathise with the deceased's father, Mr W O'Sullivan, buyer of O'Dwyer and Co, Cork, and his mother and family in their great sorrow. Mr O'Sullivan, senior, was formerly buyer at Messrs McBinney and Co, in this city. He is a native of this county, and his wife of Ballinasourra. He deceased, their eldest son, who was in his 29th year, took out his professional degree in the Royal College of Surgeons, and since he came to Limerick, a couple of years ago, enjoyed an extensive connection with city and county. He was of a very kindly and affable disposition, and highly popular. The remains were removed last evening to St Michael's parochial church, whence the funeral took place this morning for Mount St Lawrence Cemetery. The mourning drapery houses and Cruise's Hotel had their blinds drawn as a mark of respect. The cortege included many members of the drapery staffs and other firms in the city, and professional colleagues of the deceased. Some personal friends also travelled from Cork. The Bishop, Most Rev Dr Hallinan, paid the deceased a visit during his illness.

The clergy present at the funeral were—Father Deane, Adm, and Father Thorahill, C.C, St Michael's.

The chief mourners were—Mr Wm O'Sullivan (father), Mr Pat O'Sullivan (brother), Mrs O'Sullivan (mother), and the Misses Fanny, Kate, and Matty O'Sullivan (sisters of the deceased).

The funeral arrangements were carried out by Messrs Cannock and Co.

MRS M O'REILLY.

The death, which is deeply regretted by numerous friends in the city, took place this morning at her residence, 46 Richmond street, of Mrs Mary O'Reilly, at a rather advanced age. The deceased was widow of Mr Thomas O'Reilly, and had been ailing for a considerable time. She was of a kindly and gentle disposition, and her death has come as a great blow to her family, with whom general sympathy is felt in their bereavement.

MR DANIEL J PORTLEY.

His many friends in Limerick will regret to learn of the untimely death from Spanish influenza of Mr Daniel J Portley, son of Mr John Portley, Limerick, which took place on the 18th October, 1918, at Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A. at the early age of 29 years. The deceased, who before his departure for America, was well-known in Limerick, had a brilliant though brief career in the United States. He took out his degree as certified public accountant at the Illinois University, Chicago, in the year 1913, and, after some time, applied himself to the study of Law, and succeeded in being called to the Bar in June last. He held a lucrative appointment in the Real Estate Office of Cook County which embraces Chicago and its environs. The deceased leaves a widow and three children.

REALM REGULATIONS PROSECUTIONS.

John O'Malley, Roche's-street, was prosecuted under the Defence of the Realm Regulations for failing to clear up a water-course at Blackboy.

District Inspector Craig appeared to prosecute, and the defendant did not appear.

In his evidence, Mr George Deane Roe, an Inspector of the Department of Agriculture, stated notice was served on the defendant on the 19th July to clear this water-course. He had visited the place frequently since and found nothing had been done to clear the water-course.

Mr Long—What interests have been injured by the non-flow of the water in this course?

The witness—About ninety acres of land adjoining have been flooded, and the owners have complained of it.

The magistrates imposed a fine of 40s and 20s costs on the defendant.

John O'Neill, Altham street, was summoned for a like offence.

According to the testimony of Mr Deane Roe, the defendant was notified by the Department of Agriculture on the 19th July to clear a watercourse at Blackboy. The place had been visited several times, and nothing done until recently when defendant took steps to have the notice complied with.

District Inspector Craig pressed for a penalty. The Department of Agriculture required this work to be done without having recourse to legal proceedings.

The magistrates imposed a fine of 10s and 20s costs.

Edward Mulcahy, Denmarz-street, was defendant in a similar prosecution brought by the Department of Agriculture for neglecting to scour the watercourse running through his lands at Blackboy.

The notice was served on the 19th July, and until recently nothing was done to comply with it.

Defendant was fined 10s and 20s costs.
