# DEATH OF REV CORNELIUS CONWAY.

We regret to record the death, which took place on Saturday at his residence. The Crescent, of the Rev Cornelius Conway, formerly Parish Priest of St Patrick's, from which he retired several years since owing to failing health. He was born in Limerick 80 years ago, and was the first priest ordained by the late Most Rev Dr Butler, Bishop of Limerick, in 1861. He ministered for a short time in Newcastle and Croom, and was then transferred to the city, where he spent the greater portion of his life, having served in every one of the city parishes. He also spent some years in Sydney ander Cardinal Moran, and on his return to Ireland was appointed Parish Priest of St Patrick's. He was a most estimable clergyman, held in the highest respect and esteem by all classes and sevents, while to the poor he was a life-fong and generous benefactor.

Office and Requiem Mass was solemnised at St John's Cathedral yesterday, the dost Rev Dr Halliban presiding, and there being a large attendance of the clergy. The funeral subsequently took place, the interment being at of Michael's Church, of which parish Father Conway was for somelyears Administrator.

#### BANK CLERKS' SALARIES.

There has of late been (says the " New State man ") a good deal of ferment among the staffs ( the great banks, whose salaries have, to put mildly, not wholly kept page with the increase the cost of living. Lloyd's Bank appears to hav grappled boldly with the problem, for it is state that as from November let all employes whos salaries do not exceed £500 per annum receive a increase of 20 per cent, whilst thuse with highe salaries get increases tapering down to 5 per cent. This relates to the fixed salaries; 4 regards war bonuses, the present scheme is withdrawn and another substitute whereby married men (which term include single men and widdwers who are householder or have responsibilities similar to those of marrie men) receive bonuses varying from 10 to 40 percent, calculated on the increased salaries. addition, as from January 1st next, the b nk going to pay income tax on the salaries, bonuse eto, of its staff, and any advantage in the stati will be for the benefit of the members of the ets concerned. It is estimated that the extra cost this revised salary scheme will be about £375.00 per annum, or more than one-fifth of the net profeserned by the bank last year. The big banks a quick to imitate one another, and it will interesting to see to what extent this lead followed by the other institutions. ----
