in hearty accord with Munster generally in support of that scheme, the details of which will be explained by Sir Bertram Windle, and they will be awaited with much interest by the agricultural community is our own district. Another subject affecting agriculture, to which the annual report of the County Councils' General Council directs attention, is reafforestation. A deputation waited in the earlier part of the year on the Vice-President! of the Department, who stated he would urge the Government to introduce a Bill into Parliament making it compulsory on owners of woodlands felling timber to replant in the ratio of at least two trees to one felled. This, if carried out, would put tree-planting on a forward and definite basis, but a distingt scheme for Ireland is advocated. As stated in our last issue, the Limitek County Council is promoting a scheme of afforestation in this county under the Department of Agriculture. It is contemplated to plant six acres as an experiment, and the action taken by the Council Never bas deserves every commendation tree-planting been so essential as at present. considering that during the was the country was so greatly denuded of its timber. So that as a commercial enterprise, apart from any other point of view, re-afforestation has great possibilities of financial success, and of becoming a leading national asset in the gears to some. -----

# CURRENT COMMENT.

# Ministry of Transport.

The Government plans for the nationalisation of railways are far mere advanced than is generally supposed. The date collected by the Railway Executive during the war will dispose of much of the work which would otherwise have been necessary, and, in view of the all-important problem of transport reform, a Ministry of Transport will be an immediate feature of the Government reconstruction following on the General Election, Apart from the urgent needs consequent on war demobilisation, increased transport facilities must ge hand in hand with the increased production at which the nation must aim if we are to sustain ear industrial and commercial prosperity.

#### Registrar-General's Report.

The births and deaths registered in the Dublin Registration Area and in the eighteen principal provincial Urban Districts of Ireland, with the annual rates per 1,000 of the population rapresented thereby, which for the purposes of these returns, is estimated at 1,127,263, are given in Table II of the Registrar-General's report for week-ending 7th December. The births are represented by 23 in the Dublin Registration Area; Belfas, 25 3; Cork, 21 8; Londonderry, 19 6; Limerick, 20 3; Waterford, 55. The deaths from all sauses apportaining to the undermentioned areas for last week and for the past four weeks, respectively, were equal to the following annual rates per 1,000 of the population:—Nineteen Town Disannual rates per 1,000 of the population rapre-1,000 of the population :-Nineteen Town Distriots, 32 0 and 43 6 ; Dublin Registration Area. 22.5 and 31.5; Dublin City, 23.2 and 83.2; Belfast, 417 and \$6.7; Cork, 25 8 and 29 7; Sondonderry, 85.2 and 86 8; Limerick, 35.2 and 46; and Waterford, 20.9 and 40.9. The deaths from certain epidemie diseases registered in the 19 town districts during last week were squal to au sanual rate of 9.7 per 1,009. Among the \$14 deaths from all causes for Belfast are one from sparlet fever and 3 from diarrhea and enteritie of Exeter directly leave permits.
