

Metropolis, and by the Inspector-General of the Royal Irish Constabulary in the case of other districts; and in case such manager shall fail or refuse to signify such option, or to exhibit such notice, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

4.—This Order shall be read and construed with the principal Order and the said Order of the 25th day of November, 1918.

SIR DOUGLAS HAIG'S RETURN.

Complaining of the arrangement made to honor the return of Sir Douglas Haig, the "Morning Post" says.—We venture to say that London wants to give Sir Douglas Haig such another welcome as she gave the other day to General Foch. Indeed, the enthusiasm will be even greater, for Sir Douglas Haig, Sir Julian Byng, Sir Henry Rawlinson, and the other Generals are our own. It will be a bitter disappointment to London if she is not allowed to give the tried and trusted leaders of our armies such a British welcome as would be worthy of so great an occasion. The sole occasion of military display is to be a small guard of honour at Victoria Station. Is it an intentional slight. It can hardly be accidental. If the Government had correctly interpreted the feelings of London, Sir Douglas Haig would drive from end to end of the capital through triumphal arches.
