MR-GENERAL'S REPORT.

Deaths registered in the Dublin Area and in the eighteen principal Urban Districts of Ireland, with the rate per 1,000 of the population represented, which for the purposes of these estimates at 1,127,268, are given in the Registrar-General's report ending 14th December. The deaths reported by 216 in the Dublin Area; Belfast, 245; Cork, 180; Derry, 150; Limerick, 135; Waterford, 120. Deaths from all causes in the undermentioned areas for last four weeks, respectively equal to the following annual rates per 1,000 of the population:—Nineteen Town Districts and 371; Dublin Registration Area, 256; Dublin City, 239 and 273; Derry, 47 and 482; Cork, 231 and 282; Derry, 352 and 372; Limerick, 257 and Waterford, 171 and 299. The deaths in epidemic diseases registered in the 10 districts during last week were equal to an average of 0.7 per 1,000. Among the 186 deaths in all causes for Belfast are one from diphtheria, one from enteritis of children under two years, from cerebro-spinal fever. Of the 34 deaths in all causes for Cork one is from diphtheria, one from diarrhoea and enteritis under 2 years. Included in the 27 deaths in all causes for Londonderry are one male and one from scarlet fever. One of the 9 deaths in all causes for Waterford is from diphtheria.

Concerning additional land for agriculture was under consideration. EAST LIMERICK ELECTION.

It is now calculated that something like 17,000 votes were recorded at the East Limerick election out of a register of 21,582, which includes absent voters. The Sinn Fein agents estimate four to one majority for their candidate, Hayes, but no estimate is put forward by agents of the Nationalist Party. London. The scrutiny takes place in the Jury room, County Courthouse, at 12 o'clock on 28th, and it is thought the poll will not be declared until late in the evening. The voter's papers are coming in steadily, and the poll in this respect may be more extensive than was at first anticipated.

DEATH OF MR M LAFFAN.
